Renew Our Rivers began in 2000 with a cleanup by Alabama Power employees along the Coosa River at the company's Plant Gadsden. It has grown to become one of America's largest river cleanup initiatives, with the help of community partners, volunteers and organizations. Since 2000, when the program began, over 92,000 volunteers have collected almost 14 million pounds from Alabama's waterways.
